

Tower of London Fundraising Gala

The Homeopathy Research Institute (HRI) is delighted to invite you to join us for a 'night to remember' at the historic Tower of London. In celebration of HRI's 10th Anniversary, we are hosting this special gala to raise the funds needed for us to continue our work in advancing the field of homeopathy research.

The Tower Gala is a public event, open to everyone wishing to show their support for HRI.

For this once-in-a-lifetime event, you will be met on arrival by a Yeoman Warder who will give you a 15-minute walking tour of the Tower. Enjoy the impressive arms and royal armour on display in the Royal Armouries, Britain's oldest national museum, before being led to the drinks reception awaiting you in the famous White Tower.

The drinks reception will be followed by a threecourse seated dinner in the New Armouries, which boasts spectacular views, including the White Tower, Tower Bridge and the Shard.

Note: Guests will be unable to leave the Tower between 21:45 and 22:05 due to the Ceremony of the Keys, a ritual which has taken place every night for over 700 years.

As the Tower is a working barracks, the event will end at 22.05 when the Yeoman Warders escort guests out of the Tower. You are then invited to join us at the Tower Hotel next door for a nightcap, or more, at our 10th Birthday 'after party'. Please note, this is included in your gala ticket (see right).

The Tower Fundraising Gala is strictly limited to a total of 240 guests and the general admission price is £160.

The Gala has been timed to coincide with the 4th HRI International Homeopathy Research Conference (14-16 June). Over 80 researchers from 26 countries will be presenting their work at 'HRI London 2019' and we look forward to welcoming c.300 attendees from around the world.

Although this is a fundraising event, 190 gala tickets are available to conference attendees at the subsidised rate of £95, on a first-come-first-served basis.

dancing until late.




HRI Fundraising Auction
